Written report - Steps



1. Choose one area
 - Games (chp. 6)
 - Evolutionary Game Theory (chp. 7)
 - Modeling Network Traffic using Game Theory (chp. 8)
 - Auctions (chp. 9)
 - Matching Markets (chp. 10)
 - Network Models of Markets with Intermediaries (chp. 11)
 - Bargaining and Power in Networks (chp. 12)
 - Sponsored Search Markets (chp. 15)

Written report - Steps



2. Discuss a paper with your supervisor!
3. Download LaTeX template
 - ACM SIG (alternate style) from [here](#)
4. Write the report
 - Mandatory: Abstract, Introduction, Related work, Conclusions
 - Tailored: Implementation, Problem Statement, Experiments, Evaluation, etc.

Written report's requirements



- Style: write as if you were writing a survey
 - Avoid writing in first person
- Number of pages: 6
- Copy/Pastes are **plagiarism**
 - Always write in your own words

Presentation's goals



- Simulate a presentation in a scientific conference
- Learn to summarize the work in a few minutes
- Improve time management
- Have the right answer ready

Presentation - Steps



1. Download template from [here](#)
 - Format 16:9
2. Plan the structure of your presentation
 - Reach fast the problem statement
 - It should not reflect 1 to 1 the written report

Presentation's requirements



- 25 Min. presentation
- 15 Min. discussion
 - Questions from the audience (staff and students)
- Assume an IT audience, not necessarily specialists in your topic

- Quality of abstract
- Quality of related work
- Figures

Assessment – presentation



- Structure of presentation
- Story line
- Initiative
- Presentation style
- Ideas of the original paper are reflected
- Time management
- Number of slides
